- Among 10 worst business tax climates




Where Indiana Ranked 2000-01


- K-12 policies were lagging other states

Indiana Lacks Sufficient Early Learning Opportunities

- Less than half (46%) of all early learning capacity in Indiana qualifies as high quality
- More than 75% of Indiana counties have less than 25% of the high-quality seats needed to serve children in their community
- More then half of Indiana childcare workers receive public assistance



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Indiana Lacks Sufficient Early Learning Opportunities

- Hoosier families contribute nearly 12% of their annual income on childcare, exceeding the U.S. affordability threshold of 7%
- Annual median salary in Indiana is \$25,220 for pre-K teachers and \$20,279 for childcare workers
- Indiana employers cite childcare access/affordability as their top external workforce barrier



Statewide ILEARN Results

- 2022 Math + English proficiency ALL students: 30.2%
- 2022 Math + English proficiency White students: 36.6%
- 2022 Math + English proficiency <u>Black students</u>: 9.9%
- 2022 Math + English proficiency <u>Hispanic students</u>: 17.3%



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Statewide Graduation Rates With and Without Waivers

•	2021 Waivers included	86./%
•	2021 Waivers excluded	78.8%
•	2021 White students with waivers included	89.0%
•	2021 Black students with waivers included	77.1%

21st Century Scholars (2025 Graduating Class)

- Less than 40% of income-eligible students enrolled
- Less than 50% of enrolled students completed the three preparatory activities required to earn the scholarship






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Too Many (289) School Districts

- 54% of Indiana districts have less than 2,000 students
- Nearly 20% have less than 1,000 students
- Students in these smaller districts face a significant drag academically and economically
- Research found statistically significant differences in all measures of academic performance between students from smaller districts and those from larger districts











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Workforce Demands of Employers

- A study of new job postings nationwide in March 2021 found 916,000 jobs were added to the U.S. economy
- But less than 1% or just 7,000 jobs were for people with only a high school diploma









Workforce Participation Rate by Education Attainment

- Bachelor's degree or higher 72.4%
- Some college or associates degree 62.8%
- High school graduate
- Less than high school diploma
